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**Dear Colleagues,**

**Dear pairfam Users,**

At the end of this year, we would like to inform you about recent and current activities as well as future plans of the German Family Panel (pairfam) project.

While currently the data collection of wave nine is well underway and the question program for wave ten is being prepared, the pairfam staff is working on the user-friendly data preparation of wave eight. In early summer 2017 we will release the new data (release 8.0) – and it will again bring several innovations: The anchor data set will, for example, be augmented by new items on self-regulation, on the utilization of advisory services, and on pornography consumption. Moreover, additional information will be available on the relationship with the partner’s parents, both as part of the anchor’s and the partner’s survey. The child data set will comprise new variables on school aspirations, sibling relationships, and peer problems. For the step-up respondents the questions of the SDQ (Strengths and Difficulties Questionnaire) will be included, e.g. items on conduct problems and hyperactivity. There has been a marked change of the parents’ survey: This questionnaire has been significantly shortened focusing decidedly on grandparenthood including, for example, new questions on the autonomy in the grandparenting role and how the frequency of taking care for the grandchildren is being evaluated.

## **Call for Papers: 5<sup>th</sup> International pairfam User Conference in Bremen**

From the 31<sup>st</sup> of May to the 1<sup>st</sup> of June, 2017, the German Family Panel will host the fifth International pairfam User Conference at the University of Bremen. The conference will give scientists from various disciplines the chance to present their findings based on pairfam data to an international audience of professional colleagues.

We will continue the tradition of the [pairfam Awards](#) with the support of TNS Infratest Sozialforschung. The author(s) of the jury-selected best paper presented during the conference

will be honored with a 400 € prize. In addition, a further paper based on pairfam data published during the two years leading up to the conference will be chosen for the “Best Publication Award.”

## **Recent Event: 5<sup>th</sup> International pairfam Conference on “Parenting, Co-Parenting, and Child Well-Being in Changing Families” in Munich**

The [5<sup>th</sup> International pairfam Conference](#) covered the topics of parenthood, parenting, and child development in the context of familial change. It took place in Munich from June 29<sup>th</sup> to July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2016.

Questions of changing approaches and demands to both parenthood and parenting play an important role in national and international discourse. In parallel, educational and attachment research have a long tradition, which concerns itself with aspects of family life that are conducive to, or are in fact a strain on children's development. The goal, as with previous pairfam conferences, was to provide an opportunity to share ideas on current issues and findings on a wide international and interdisciplinary scope. Contributions based on pairfam data were welcome, but the exchange of knowledge of very different data and methods was also expressly encouraged.

Four keynote speakers, eleven presentations, as well as two poster sessions including a total of fourteen poster presentations provided an excellent opportunity for intellectual exchange. Compared to previous pairfam conferences, this year's international response was much higher, with a total of seventeen contributions: six from England, four from Switzerland, and three from the USA, along with one from Canada, the Netherlands, Italy, and Austria, respectively. In addition to psychological and sociological research, input from a demographic as well as educational perspective was also offered. Overall, a wide range of topics was raised. Several contributions dealt with aspects of changing family forms, which seem to derive from instability within romantic relationships, new partnerships, and also family formation after fertility treatments. Modified role constellations and parenting techniques, as well as mobility and media use aspects were mentioned, along with inequalities between and within families – the latter using new data from the Twin Life study. Further, familial influences on the mental health, educational success, and sexual behavior of children and youth were investigated. Intervention programs to reinforce partnerships and parenting were also presented.

The four keynote presentations focused on different phases of family development, observed parent-child relationships in a wider family context, in particular regarding parents' relationships, and implemented various methodological approaches. Ingrid Schoon (Professor of Human Development and Social Policy at the Quantitative Social Sciences (QSS) department at the University of London's Institute of Education) presented results from the Millenium Cohort Study, covering familial risk factors and their influence on child development. Susan Branje (Professor at the Utrecht Center for Child and Adolescent Studies (CAS) at the University of Utrecht) focused on the importance of emotional variability for the development of parent-child relationships in adolescence and the psychosocial development of youth. Guy Bodenmann (Professor of Clinical Psychology at the University of Zürich) discussed the interdependence of both parents in the parenting scheme, and their respective importance for child development in view of the concept of co-parenting. Kathryn Edin (Bloomberg Distinguished Professor at the Department of Sociology, Zanvyl Krieger School of Arts and Sciences and Department of Population, Family, and Reproductive Health, Bloomberg School of Public Health at John Hopkins University in Baltimore) reported her findings on instability and complexity of families in the USA, with a particular focus on adolescent fathers.

In addition, the pairfam team organized a Pre-Conference Workshop on June 29<sup>th</sup>, 2016. The focus was on analyzing the pairfam child and parenting data using the statistical software SPSS. The workshop included an introduction to working with pairfam data and advice on data handling and analysis strategies based on practical examples.

We hope that this conference has also provided motivation for the use of pairfam data to answer psycho-developmental and socio-educational research questions.

### **Additional Paradata available for Waves 1-7**

As a new feature, the pairfam gross data sets for the anchor's survey of waves 1-7 are available upon request. These data sets contain the cases of the whole population for each wave who have been contacted for an additional interview, i.e. all anchor persons who took part in the previous wave's survey and did not object to being re-interviewed, or who missed out on the previous wave due to temporal or personal reasons. The following information on the fieldwork is available: number of contact attempts (personal, by phone, and by e-mail), interviewer identification numbers, and a detailed breakdown of the final processing status (especially different reasons for non-participation). Thus, these paradata provide the opportunity, for example, to conduct non-response analyses.
